"Congratulations!" Said the presenter of the Second International Bioethics Debate Tournament held at Kyushu University-Hakozaki Campus in Japan as he handed me the champion certificate. At that moment, I looked back with gratitude to my experiences as the chair of the English debate society of XXXX University in China, which had given me the skills to succeed in this challenging competition.

In 2009, when I was only a sophomore, I was selected as the youngest chair ever of the English Debate Society.
